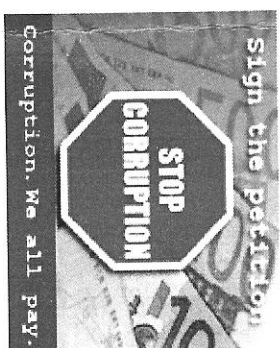


# Questionnaire for Political Parties and Candidates
